Director's Note

Time and water are inextricably linked to one another.

We can never stand in the same spot of a river twice, just as we cannot return to a moment in time and have all involved, including ourselves, remain unchanged by what has transpired. These are central themes that we see in each of the main characters in "The Great Gatsby" - a desire to hold on to something from the past that no longer exists. The water separating the mansions of Daisy and Gatsby shimmers with the green light at the end of the dock and connects them. For Gatsby, a rippling hope that leads to a love he never stopped believing in, and for Daisy, a reawakening of a love kept paused, dormant, and previously discarded. While we now know that the famous line written into this novel by Fitzgerald referencing that the best thing a girl can be in this world is a "beautiful little fool" was originally said by Fitzgerald's wife, Zelda, we can see how it resonated with him in his creations Daisy, Myrtle, and Jordan - all of whom choose to limit their own view of the world for self-interest and protection, refusing to see a larger picture of their own situation and impact on others. In our unreliable narrator, Nick Caraway, we see something different: action by inaction. This, paired with a blinded belief in Gatsby, refrains from stopping abhorrent actions of Tom, Daisy, and Jordan, ultimately leading to a tragic ending for all involved in this one short, gin-filled summer.

In this adaptation, Nick begins to recount from just two years after the events of 1922. His narration paints for us that we are only a few years out from his and Gatsby's years in the trenches during the Great War. At every moment of this story, there is a potential catalytic event that begins a domino cascade of repercussions, both romance-filled and devastating — which moment could have been prevented? And how much of this burden falls to Nick Caraway for reuniting Daisy Buchanan and Jay Gatsby?

Please enjoy this World Premiere adaptation of "The Great Gatsby" and allow yourself to be transported back in time to the star-filled skies and floating, dropped waists of the 1920's as we suspend time for just a moment to sayor the what-if's and what-never-could-be's.


