



Director's Note

Arthur Miller and I have something in common - we both attended the University of Michigan. During my time at U of M, Arthur Miller often returned to campus to conduct lectures with the theatre students. For one of his lectures, we were asked to read *A View From The Bridge*.

I vividly remember the first time I read the play, I was immediately captivated by the story of Brooklyn longshoreman Eddie Carbone and the tight-knit, hardworking, Italian community. I asked myself - who are these people at their core? What are their rituals and beliefs? And most importantly, where did their passions lie?

Universally speaking, we are all looking for a place to call home and commonality - we all want to be a part of a community. But what happens when you betray your family, friends, and community? What happens when your obsessions and desires conflict with the people around you? What happens when the community that you trusted, ultimately turns its back on you?

These are the questions that engrossed me as I read A View From The Bridge for the first time. These are the questions that first captivated me. The exploration of these questions makes A View From The Bridge as topical and relevant as it was when it first opened in 1956.

Eamon Arthur (Louis) is an actor and vocalist studying Performing Arts with a concentration in Theater at Endicott College in Beverly, Massachusetts. Recent stage credits include Shakespeare in "Something Rotten!" with MLT, as well as Nick Bottom in "Something Rotten!" at (EC) and Romeo in "Romeo and Juliet" (EC). Other credits include "The 39 Steps," "Head Over Heels," "She Kills Monsters" (EC), "Be More Chill" (Stage 284), as well as Father, Michael, Grandfather, Stuart, Gordon, Jim in A.R. Gurney's "The Dining Room." Eamon has also appeared on screen in the television pilot of "Buckle Up!" by APM Films as "Dillon". Victor Brandalis (Mr. Lipari/Tony Bereli) This is Victor's third appearance with MLT. His appearances at MLT have been in The Resistible Rise of Arturo Ui as Givola, Arsenic and Old Lace as Teddy, and Inherit the Wind as Henry Drummond. He has been performing since 1989 in New Hampshire, Texas, New Jersey, California, and Massachusetts. Over the years, his two favorite performances were in the female version of The Odd Couple as Jesus Costazuela and in the

Irish musical Grannia as Donal O'Flaherty. Joe LaRocca (Eddie Carbone) is one of America's most sought-after woodwind players, earning a reputation among theaters around the country for his versatility as a multi-wind and multi-genre artist. Joe's ease with all genres combined with a commanding stage presence has quickly made him a go-to choice for top theaters around the country, bringing pit musicians into the spotlight for on-stage musician roles. With primary focus on flute, saxophone, clarinet, and double reeds, Joe's expertise extends to include a wide assortment of ethnic and historical winds, bringing opportunities to explore more traditional orchestral and chamber performances, as well as new experimental works.

Joe's on-stage work has gained recognition from multiple organizations, including an award from the St. Louis Theater Circle for his work on The Lehman Trilogy (St. Louis Repertory Theater), and two 2024 Elliot Norton Awards nominations for his work on The Lehman Trilogy (Huntington Theatre) and The Band's Visit (Huntington Theatre/Speakeasy Stage). Other credits include Jesus Christ Superstar 50th Anniversary National Tour, Beautiful: The Carole King

Musical (Ogunquit Playhouse), American Repertory Theater's production of Gatsby, and will perform in the ensemble cast as "Sully O'Hara" along with playing the reed book on Speakeasy Stage's production of A Man of No Importance.

Outside of the theater realm, Joe has an extensive list of concerti, solos, and chamber music, and has enjoyed principal flute positions at The Du Bois Orchestra, Boston Chamber Symphony, Cape Ann Symphony, Metropolitan Wind Symphony, and others. Joe holds a Bachelor's of Music in Saxophone Performance from Columbia College Chicago, Master's of Music in Multi-Wind Performance from Northern Illinois University, and was the recipient of the coveted Artist Diploma in Flute Performance from Longy School of Music at Bard College, being the sole recipient of the diploma that year. He divides his time between Gloucester and Cambridge, MA where he works as an orchestral and theater musician and private woodwind instructor.

Billy Lewand (Marco) is excited to be back at MLT after playing Arturo Ui in "The Resistible Rise of Arturo Ui" this past fall. Other recent credits include assistant directing "Twelfth Night" for Cape Ann Shakespeare Troupe and playing Caliban in "The Tempest" with Olde Essex Stage Company. Huge thanks to the production staff and cast for making this such a fun experience, and as always, eternal gratitude and love to Emily and Junebug for always supporting him!

Jack Newton ("Submarine" Two / Neighbor) is thrilled to return to Marblehead Little Theatre for his second production! Arthur Miller (Author) was born in Harlem the son of Polish immigrants. Financial hardship follown the Wall Street Crash and beginning of the depression compelled the Miller family to move to Brooklyn in 1929.

Miller graduated from high school in 1933 and was initially refused ad mission by both Cornell University and the University of Michigan. The University of Michigan eventually accepted him where he studied journalism, became the night editor of the Michigan Daily, and began experimenting with theater.

After leaving university, Miller wrote plays in 1939 for the Federal Theatre. The Federal Theatre provided work for unemployed writers, actors, directors, and designers. Congress closed the Federal Theatre late in 1939.

During Miller's 60 plus year writing career, he wrote twenty-six plays including "The Crucible," "All My Sons" and "Death of a Salesman." Miller's plays generally address social issues and center around an individual in a social dilemma, or an individual at the mercy of society.


